

LEARNING SCIENCES, CERTIFICATE IN (GRADUATE CERTIFICATE)

The Certificate in Learning Sciences is an online program that provides students with an advanced understanding of the learning process and how to apply that knowledge in designing educational experiences. The program is designed to integrate applied learning science theory with cutting-edge instructional design technologies to impact student learning, engagement and motivation. Students will learn foundational learning theories, methodologies and technology central to educational psychology and instructional design, including the incorporation of innovative uses of technology. Students will learn to create educational experiences based on the latest research in learning sciences, emphasizing evidence-based, effective and equitable practices, and apply these skills to inform the design and implementation of instructional content in both online and in-person learning formats. Graduates will be able to plan, design and deliver adult learning in both formal and informal settings. Graduates will also be able to create engaging learning activities and develop course content to facilitate knowledge acquisition for learners from early childhood to adulthood.

Student learning outcome

In addition to the general admission requirements of the VCU Graduate School (<http://bulletin.vcu.edu/graduate/study/admission-graduate-study/admission-requirements/>), the following requirements represent the minimum acceptable standards for admission:

1. Bachelor's degree
2. Three letters of recommendation addressing the student's potential for graduate study in education
3. Statement of intent
4. Transcripts of all previous college work
5. Resume or curriculum vitae

Degree requirements

The curriculum is designed to provide students with the principles and techniques of the learning process to enhance educational experiences with a specific focus on utilizing and integrating eLearning in instructional design and learning. Course work exposes students to the fundamentals of psychological principles as they relate to the teaching-learning process and how to integrate technology and research into design and delivery. Courses involve hands-on experiences and applied projects to prepare students to develop and implement equitable and evidence-based effective instruction across a range of formal and informal learning settings. Students will learn the cognitive and social processes that result in the most effective learning, and understand how to use this knowledge to redesign classrooms and other in-person and virtual learning environments so that people learn more deeply and more effectively.
